	Myopia control is no longer a field of optometry that is only practiced by the few, it is fast becoming essential for all optometrists. For early career optometrists, the most difficult part is figuring out where to begin and how to combine knowledge to individualise myopia control treatments. Sarah and Rebecca will discuss the benefits of contact lenses for myopia control, including both soft and orthokeratology, what kind of patients they are best for and how to monitor patients for myopia progression and other side effects.

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#### Alex Koutsokeras

Alex is a therapeutically-endorsed clinical optometrist with particular expertise in specialty contact lenses and dry eye management. She achieved her optometry degree with first class honours from the University of Auckland. Prior to this, she completed a psychology degree from the University of Sydney. Alex has also completed advanced studies in glaucoma.



#### **Peter Heydon**

Peter is a fellowship trained uveitis and medical retina specialist, cataract surgeon and general ophthalmologist. His ophthalmology training was conducted at Sydney Eye Hospital followed by a 2-year fellowship at Moorfields Eye Hospital, London. He currently holds two public hospital posts (Royal Prince Alfred and Liverpool Hospitals.) He is a clinical lecturer with both the University of NSW and University of Sydney. Peter consults at Northern Beaches Cataract in Brookvale, South West Vision Institute in Liverpool and Central Sydney Eye Surgeons in Camperdown.



#### Jason Cheng

Jason is a glaucoma specialist with extensive surgical and laser experience (including trabeculectomy, tube implant, angle surgery and minimally invasive glaucoma surgery or MIGS). He completed two glaucoma subspecialty fellowships – one in the UK and one in Canada – and worked in Singapore for 3 years prior to moving to Australia. He is a conjoint lecturer at UNSW, visiting faculty at Fiji National University and visiting medical officer at Liverpool Hospital. His current research interests include ways to improve the quality of treatment for glaucoma patients through medication, laser and surgery.
